Lives Lived

Heinrich Reimer 1908-1939



Reading about lives once lived reveals trials, triumphs and tears. So it is with the life the Heinrich Reimer family: a life too soon extinguished, a young wife and mother suddenly widowed and two very young now-fatherless sons.

For 31 year old Heinrich Reimer, Tuesday, March 8, 1938 held a busy work schedule. Too soon in the year to start trimming the fruit trees on the small farm that Heinrich and his wife Justina (nee Peters) owned on

Concession 4 near Hunter Road, Heinrich had volunteered his day for work on the new church building...

The first "Russian" Mennonites settled in the Virgil area in the mid 1930's. In 1937, after efforts to purchase a building fell through, a decision was made to build a church, two kilometers north-east of Virgil. The first meeting of the new congregation was held in the basement in early 1938. Finishing touches on the parking lot were still needed, with Heinrich, Gerhard Neufeld, Henry Braun and Jacob Wiens volunteering to cut large stone and haul gravel from Larkin Farm Quarry (north of Queenston) to the church.

Despite some misgivings regarding undercutting a 14 foot overhanging cliff, the four young men continued to shear away the cliff. Heinrich was working nearby when the giant rock mass broke free. He was freed within minutes of the rock slide but death had already come for Heinrich.

Of the accident, Margaret Neufeld (close friend to Heinrich's wife Justina) wrote in her daily diary: "The weight and mass simply crushed him so that death most likely was immediate. It is terrible. Death strikes quickly and with no respite... Poor, poor Justa. She and her mother were visiting with the Enns' when the news was

brought to her. Justa and Heinz were married the same year as we (1935), so less than five years. And now she is a widow with two small children. How will she carry this bitter pain? But for each of us, it is a loud and clear word of God... God, our heavenly Father, is our only refugee in such distress."

Church family and friends grieved greatly. The funeral for Heinrich Reimer was held at the Niagara United Mennonite Church on Monday, March 13, 1939. Peter Kroeker based his message on Psalm 39 where King David asks God to remind him on the brevity of life, His deliverance from all our transgressions and to find hope and strength in God's presence in any situation.

So that was a life that was lived. Justina Reimer, also aged 31 at the time of her husband's death, never remarried, dedicating her life to raise up her two sons, Willy (d. 2013) and Henry. The fruit trees left untrimmed by Heinrich on their farm were looked after that year and for a number of years thereafter by her brother and neighbour John D. Peters. Justina died in 1973 at the age of 65. Henry, one year old at the time of his father's death, lived on Concession 4 for many years, and retired from working at The Town of Niagara-On-The-Lake in 1995 after 30 years of service.

The plaque below, was placed in the church foyer in December 2025 in remembrance of this life lived.
